WELCOME TO THE PARISH MASS FOR THE TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The collect for this week speaks of the abundance of God's kindness and mercy. It is such a refreshing prayer that reminds us of God's incredible goodness.

In fact, God is what it is to be good, and His goodness is infinite. We are used to a world of scarcity, where there just doesn't seem to be enough time, money, food, or any other of the good things we need which makes life good. Our prayer today reminds us who we are praying to. God is not like us, He's not limited by time, nor space, and He certainly doesn't need the things we need to live, like food and shelter. Yet is in His goodness and mercy that He has appeared to us in the flesh, in the man Jesus Christ (the God-man is an ancient title of Christ -in Greek it is theanthropos). God shows His goodness by limiting His power so that He might draw near to us, and vet remain in some sense hidden - remember His own disciples didn't know who He was when He walked with them. In the Mass we recognise Him in the breaking of the Bread and the pouring out of the wine into the cup of His suffering. When we see how Good and full of kindness God is, let us not fear to bring to Him our prayers - for prayer is a confession of those needs in our lives, needs that He is already aware of! Gospel - Mark 10.2-16

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide,' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

Introduction (Continuation)

We don't always understand how God is at work in our lives, but we can continue to trust that He is at work, and that He is present with us in the midst of troubles, and present with us in Holy Communion. This week, let's keep reminding ourselves of God's abundant goodness and kindness, and His abiding presence with us in our lives.

First Reading - The Book of Genesis 2.18-24

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven.

These he brought to the man to see what he would call them; each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. (Continued)

First Reading - The Book of Genesis 2.18-24 (continuation)

So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh.

The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man.

The man exclaimed: 'This at last is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh!

This is to be called woman, for this was taken from man.'
This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

Second Reading -The Letter to the Hebrews 2.9-11

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.
